

# Born Anew

One of my favorite activities to do with my family is to celebrate our children's baptism birthdays. They are another reminder of the blessing we have in our own baptism and the gift of being adopted as a child of God. Our family will gather, often times with the child's sponsor, and sing the baptismal hymn that was sung on that special day when they were baptized. January 1, 2023 – Epiphany Observed Psalm 31:1-5; Isaiah 60:1-6; Matthew 2:1-12

"New Year's Comfort" - Sermon Text: Matthew 2:1-12 - Rev. Dr. Walter Maier III

One of the most important things the Bible teaches us about Baptism is death. In fact, Paul's words in Romans 6 tell us that Baptism is first about death. As odd as this may sound, it is only when we understand the death that occurs in our Baptism, that we can fully live as God's people.
