### Celebrating God's provision for our ministry at Worship Anew

n October 15, 2017, our ministry celebrated a significant milestone by hosting our annual appreciation event. This occasion was particularly noteworthy because it marked the official rebranding of our ministry from Worship for Shut-Ins to Worship Anew. This new name emphasized our broader mission and vision, providing clearer insight into how our program was connecting with a much larger audience.

One of the champions of this important transition was Dr. Rich Bimler, who graciously accepted our invitation to be the keynote speaker for the event. His presence and words of encouragement were instrumental in guiding us through this season of change.

In 2020, Worship Anew took another significant step by acquiring Hope-Full Living, a beloved devotional publication

that had long been offered to viewers of our weekly televised program. Once again, we leaned on Dr. Bimler for his wisdom and guidance. Hope-Full Living was the brainchild of the late Rev. Walter Schoedel and Dr. Bimler, both respected leaders in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS). Continuing his active role, Dr. Bimler served as Editor-at-Large. In the first issue under our stewardship in October 2020, he fittingly quoted Philippians 4:19 (ESV): "And my God shall supply all your needs according to his riches in glory by Christ Jesus."

Just as God provided Worship Anew with the opportunity to carry on the legacy of Hope-Full Living, He also blessed us with Dr. Bimler's faithful partnership during these two pivotal moments. These milestones have expanded our reach and allowed us to share God's Word with even more

# 3 years of dedication Paul Malin ratings after years of

# Paul Melin retires after years of faithful service to Worship Anew

ver his 30 years at Worship Anew, Paul Melin has served as the director of video production and accessibility. But, for many, that title has meant something more. To them, he has been the provider of comfort in their time of need, the coordinator of song for their favorite hymns, an encourager for their family, the inspiration for their career, and the director who brought God's Word into their home.

In 1995, Melin joined the ministry as a production engineer, and since then, he has helped to mold and shape Worship Anew into the muchbeloved program that it is today.

"It was important for us to always try to use any form of media ministry for Worship Anew to be shared with the community," Melin said.

Over time, Melin helped to shift how the program was organized, giving

more time for the pastors to preach; he added subtitles and closed captioning to provide more accessibility for those who wanted to watch the program; and he has photographed — including doing drone work — countless churches and stained-glass windows to show as transitions on the program.

"In 1998, St. Peter, Minn., had an F5 tornado go through, and I saw a Catholic church where it had completely blown out the stained glass windows," he recalled. "I thought to myself, at that time, I was going to start photographing stained glass windows and use those as transitions between the pastor and the choir."

It was a way to give new life to those windows and to ensure that they would live on, regardless of what happened to the church.

He also worked with Ken Schilf, retired executive director of Worship for Shut-Ins (Worship Anew's previous name), to take the program from being recorded at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Fort Wayne, Ind., to its current home on the Concordia Theological Seminary campus.

"As the TV program kept growing ... it was getting more and more difficult to schedule a choir or to do a Tuesday morning pastor production when there were activities out in the church, so we spent two or three years looking for facilities in Fort Wayne," Melin said. "In the process of moving, the seminary people had also invited us to talk about using an empty dorm room or a dorm building. God led us in the right direction where He would want us to build a TV studio and work along with the Seminary staff."

In time, he saw pastors, staff, and volunteers come and go, but he remained a constant for the ministry and for the viewers — something about which they have expressed gratitude.

This summer, Melin retired from the ministry to pursue other interests and passions, but his footprints will forever remain a part of Worship Anew. They are ingrained in every program that he directed, every team member that he inspired, and every viewer that was blessed by Worship Anew.

"We are filled with gratitude for Paul and for the incredible work he has dedicated over the years in support of the ministry," said Matthew Leighty, executive director of Worship Anew. "Paul's unwavering heart for serving others and his passion for sharing the love of Christ are gifts for which we will always be thankful."



### Jill Rodenbeck

Jill Rodenbeck has been writing devotions for Hope-Full Living for three years, but she didn't begin her life in the church until she was in grade school.



After moving to a new town, her parents were unimpressed with the public school education provided there. The only private school near them was a Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS) school. Since her father didn't know much about Lutheran churches or their schools, he decided a visit was in order.

"We all attended St. Paul Lutheran Church that Sunday, which was Palm Sunday," she recalled. "This was a confirmation service where over 40 eighth graders dressed in white robes occupied the front pews. This was an impressive display of knowledge, so my dad decided we'd go back the next week. It was Easter. Dad heard the Easter gospel for the first time ... We all started information classes to get baptized and registered for school."

Since that time, the Lord has blessed her with His gifts to share the gospel with others.

As a Lutheran educator, she has always enjoyed reading and writing, but she was unsure about writing for Hope-Full Living when she was asked.

"I wasn't sure anyone would find what I had to say worth considering, so I was happily surprised when different members in my congregation would stop me after church and comment that a particular devotion was helpful to them," she said. "That feedback encouraged me to stay with it."

Rodenbeck finds inspiration for her devotions from worship services, Christian music, and reading scripture. She makes notes as ideas fill her head.

"I ruminate and cogitate (one of my dad's favorite phrases) until something hits me," she said. "Once I have an idea, the words flow pretty well."

### **Rev. Paul Hoffman**

For the Rev. Paul Hoffman, writing a devotional for Hope-Full Living is "just a small example of writing a sermon."

Hoffman served as a pastor for 41 years. Now technically retired, he still preaches often and visits shut-ins for his church.

Prior to writing for Hope-Full Living, which he started doing at the end of 2022, Hoffman read the devotional at his church.

"I was impressed how Hope-Full Living was geared to seniors, and it spoke to how God strengthens us to deal with our concerns," he said. "In addition, I appreciate how the authors often told stories which meant a lot to me."

Inspiration for his writing comes by meditating on scripture and letting the images speak to him. He also considers his life stories and scripture responses to those experiences and incorporates that into his writing.

"Hope-Full Living especially touches upon the blessings and sorrows of seniors," he said. "We are often limited physically and mentally, and we often suffer losses, such as the loss of a spouse or a good friend. Anyone can read Hope-Full Living, but especially seniors who need reminders about God's powerful hope in their limited lives."

For Harriet Monn Stennfeld, writing has been a big part of her life — from writing poetry to writing prayers for sermons. Writing became a way for her to express her thoughts, feelings, and faith.



"I thought it was God's gift to me to use," she said. "Some people are good singers, but I can't carry a tune so that used to make me feel really bad. But, then one day I came to realize that God's gift to me was something different."

And ever since, she has been using her gift of writing and poetry to share with others — sometimes through church, sometimes by request, and sometimes through life's toughest moments.

In her self-published book, "The View from My Window: A Collection of Poetry," she writes poems for birthdays, anniversaries, celebrations at her church, and family losses, including the loss of her grandson, Jonathan.

"Tiny fingers and tiny toes
One eye that never seemed to close
Your soft and sweet, yet fragile touch

Your little body fought to live
Until it had not more to give.
In Mommy's arms, you fell asleep

in their walk of faith," said Mark Zimmermann, senior product developer for Creative Communications. "What makes the devotional so special is that each reflection is written by a senior about living out their faith in the world today."

The team originally began by reaching out to Lutheran Senior Services in the St. Louis, Mo., area to be recipients as well as writers for the publication. The editorial staff at the time held focus groups to receive feedback on the theological content in the devotions and then established guidelines to create the publication.

Bimler was named the honorary editor, and both he and Schoedel wrote for the publication.

In 2020, Creative Communications decided to transition away from Hope-Full Living, and Worship Anew was

contacted to pick up the mantle of the publication.

"Worship Anew had been promoting and sending out Hope-Full Living to our viewers for a couple of years before we acquired the publication. It had become a dearly loved devotional, aligning with our primary audience of older adults," said Matthew Leighty, executive director of Worship Anew. "While we thought about creating our own devotional, Hope-Full Living proved to be such a good fit that it didn't seem necessary. When the opportunity arose, the ministry and our board recognized that it would be an excellent addition to our mission."

In the transition, Schoedel continued as writer until his passing in 2023, and Bimler continued on as the Editor-at-Large, working alongside the ministry team at Worship Anew.

"Dad felt that Worship Anew coupled with Hope-Full Living was critical to keeping older adults connected to their church and their Savior," said John Schoedel, son of the Rev. Walter Schoedel.

Since taking on the publication, Hope-Full Living has continued to grow through more contributors and subscribers, and most importantly, in its mission "to inspire God's seniors with the assurance that 'This very day, I have a body, a mind, a spirit and a message — God's rejuvenating Gospel message to and through me

— to share with my world, my friends, and my Lord," as shared by Bimler.

"The vision we had then has truly come to pass and then some through the work that Worship Anew has done, not just through the devotional, but through their outreach efforts." Zimmerman said.



### HONORING DR. RICH BIMLER AS EDITOR EMERITUS

r. Rich Bimler always has a smile on his face and a joke in his pocket. He is the Ambassador of Health, Hope, and Aging (AH-HA!), and he "joyfully" lives up to that mantra.

For five years with Worship Anew and for nine years prior with Creative Communications, Bimler has served as the Honorary Editor and Editor-at-Large of Hope-Full Living. Today, as he steps away from his work as the Editor-at-Large, Bimler is being honored with the title of Editor Emeritus of Hope-Full Living.

"Dr. Rich Bimler has brought his personal style to this beautiful devotional publication. His humor and joy for the Lord resonate in his own writings and are infused into the devotions authored by our much-loved authors," said Matthew Leighty, executive

director of Worship Anew. "As Dr. Bimler moves into his new role as Editor Emeritus, we are so grateful to know that his legacy will carry on through Hope-Full Living as it will continue to share the hope we have in Christ Jesus our Lord."

Bimler has spent years as a champion of older adults and says it is important to find the joy in aging and to celebrate the gifts that God has given them.

"Aging is a gift," said Bimler, who is currently 84. "Joyfully aging is true because of the Lord."

The title of Ambassador of Health, Hope, and Aging was given to him along the way in his career, but he has definitely owned the "AH-HA!" of the title and lived it out in his life.

"Every time he talked, he'd bring 87 buttons to pass out. 'You wanna be an 'AH-HA' person? Here's a button," his wife, Hazel, laughed as she recalled.

As faithful readers of Hope-Full Living over the years would recall, he signed each letter at the start of the devotional with "Dr. Rich Bimler, Editor at Large, Ambassador of Health, Hope, and Aging (AH-HA)."

"I go around saying it to people, and they look at me kind of weird, but it's a good way to say we're here to celebrate the Lord's presence," Bimler said. "That's the joy that we have had to bring joyfulness rather than, oh golly, another year older and this hurts and that hurts. But, it's to say that the Lord is still there in the midst of it."

His messages in Hope-Full Living and through his work in his books and other areas of his career have shared the same message:

"It is so good to keep saying, 'AH-HA.' Sometimes I don't feel like AH-HA, but that's OK because our Lord is still with us," he said.

As he transitions out of his role with Hope-Full Living, he's blessed to see how the authors are continuing the work to provide devotionals that are shaped for aging adults and by doing it in a way that keeps the "AH-HA."

"I think the writers get as much of a blessing with their writing as the people who read the devotions because that's therapy for them, as well — to share their life, what's happened in their life, what's lifted them up, what's made them go on, and what's helped them to age joyfully," Hazel shared.

"There's a lot of devotional booklets out there, but the authors that you have put together are so real. They are living it," Bimler added. "They are not just church professionals, but they're doing it because they've got a gift for writing, and more than that, they've got a relationship with our Lord, and that's just marvelous."

Despite changes in his life, Bimler still continues to live joyfully and hold up his mantle of being an Ambassador of Health, Hope, and Aging. He continues to pass out Hope-Full Living devotionals in his church and anyone that he comes across. He sees Hope-Full Living as a way to open the door to have a conversation with someone who is hurting.

"It's easy to talk about Hope-Full Living. A couple of times (when I visited a nursing home), they were so elated that someone brought something to them," Bimler said. "They are so pleased because it touches them. That's just a powerful thing."

"See, joyfully aging, that is because aging is a gift," Bimler said.

## Important reasons to have a Will in place

s we age, planning for the future becomes increasingly important. Ensuring that our wishes are respected and our loved ones are cared for requires careful consideration and preparation. Three critical documents that every senior should have are an up-to-date Will, a Power of Attorney, and an Advanced Healthcare Directive. These documents provide peace of mind and ensure that our wishes and desires are honored in the future and should be discussed with your family before they are needed.

#### **Up-to-Date Will**

A Will is a legal document that outlines how your assets and property will be distributed after your death. Having an up-to-date will is crucial for several reasons:

Clarity and Avoidance of Disputes: An updated Will clearly states your intentions, reducing the likelihood of disputes among family members. It also ensures that your assets can be distributed according to your wishes.

**Protection of Loved Ones:** A Will allows you to designate guardians for children and grandchildren if you have custody, ensuring their care and financial security.

**Charitable Giving:** Including a charity in your Will is a meaningful way to leave a legacy and support causes you care about.

#### **Power of Attorney**

A Power of Attorney (POA) is a legal document that grants someone you trust the authority to make decisions on your behalf if you become incapacitated and cannot conduct needed business or communicate decisions. There are two main types of POA:

**Financial POA:** This allows your designated agent to manage your financial affairs, such as paying bills, managing investments, and handling property transactions.

**Healthcare POA:** This grants your agent the authority to make medical decisions for you if you are unable to do so yourself (similar to the Advanced Healthcare Directive below).

Having a POA is essential because it ensures that your affairs are managed according to your wishes, even if you are unable to communicate them. It provides a trusted individual with the legal authority to act in your best interest, preventing potential financial or medical crises.

#### **Advanced Healthcare Directive**

An Advanced Healthcare Directive, also known as a living will in some states, outlines your preferences for medical treatment in case you are unable to make decisions for yourself. This document typically includes provisions for the following:



### I have poor eyesight. Is Hope-Full Living available in large print?

Hope-Full Living is printed in a larger, 14.5-point font and is printed on light paper to make the publication very readable. If you need a large print version that is recognized by the American Council of the Blind, we have partnered with Lutheran Braille Workers to provide a special devotion that is provided at no cost. ### How many authors do you have and where do they come from?

We have more than 100 authors who regularly contribute to Hope-Full Living. For each quarter, we have anywhere between 60 to 75 authors who have one to two devotions published. Our authors are all over the United States and are all older adults because our devotions speak to the issues, needs, and challenges that older adults are facing.

This document ensures that your medical care aligns with your values and desires, providing guidance to healthcare providers and loved ones during difficult times. Discussing your wishes with family members now allows time to make difficult decisions before an emergency arises.

#### Our Annual Write-A-Will Time is Here

In his retirement, he gives freely of time and talents and anything else asked of him.


He volunteers through Holy Cross Lutheran Church (Fort Wayne, Ind.) Senior Saints and donates platelets at the Red Cross every two weeks.

# James - The Epistle of Joy?

y grandmother and my mother said many times that the letter of James was their favorite. My grandmother would comment that James was a "very practical" letter. I agree with her.

James wrote "Be doers of the Word and not hearers only." (1:22 ESV)
James was criticized by Martin
Luther as an "epistle of straw." When
Luther wrote that, he was fighting against the "we are saved by our works" belief. Luther did quote from
James in the Large Catechism. Luther did come to appreciate James.

James assumes we are saved by God's grace. We are "hearers" of God's word. James goes on to say that our faith does not end with us just hearing God's Word. He calls us

to be "doers" of the word.

James wrote "So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead." (2:17 ESV) We say we are saved by faith alone, but faith is never alone. As theologians would say, we are justified before God by His grace through faith. Now being justified we are motivated in how we live. We call this sanctification, living the way God would want us to live.

James starts his letter with words, "Count it all joy ... when you meet trials." James is writing to the church who is being persecuted. Some things never change. We who live in our world today suffer persecution. James tells you "Count it all joy." When persecutions and trials come we can ask the Lord to help us.

James also tells us to "Be Patient" (5:7 ESV) until the Lord's coming. It can be very frustrating when things do not happen the way we want it to happen. The older I get, the more my body does not do what I want it to do. James reminds me to "Be Patient."

James ends his letter with, "confess your sins to one another and pray for one another." (5:16 ESV) Confessing and praying is faith in action. "Count it all joy" brothers and sisters when sins are forgiven.

5 If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask God, who gives generously to all without reproach, and it will be given him. 6 But let him ask in faith, with no doubting, for the one who doubts is like a wave of the sea that is driven and tossed by the wind. 7 For that person must not suppose that he will receive anything from the Lord; 8 he is a double-minded man, unstable in all his ways.

9 Let the lowly brother boast in his exaltation, 10 and the rich in his humiliation, because like a flower of the grass he will pass away. 11 For the sun rises with its scorching heat and withers the grass; its flower falls, and its beauty perishes. So also will the rich man fade away in the midst of his pursuits.

12 Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial, for when he has stood the test he will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those who love him. 13 Let no one say when he is tempted, "I am being tempted by God," for God cannot be tempted with evil, and he himself tempts no one. 14 But each person is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire. 15 Then desire when it has conceived gives birth to sin, and sin when it is fully grown brings forth death.

16 Do not be deceived, my beloved brothers. 17 Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change. 18 Of his own will he brought us forth by the word of truth, that we should be a kind of firstfruits of his creatures.


#### YOUNGER CHILDREN
